CRES-1851 Introduction to Conflict Analysis and Resolution (Required in Diploma and Degree)	Students study and practice interdisciplinary conflict resolution skills. Adopting a multidisciplinary approach, including ideas drawn from the study of psychology, sociology, anthropology, law, and political science.	\$680.70
ESMS-1100 Emergency & Security Legislation (Required in Diploma and Degree)	Learn how legislation provides a foundation for informed emergency management, safety, and security decision making as well as effective management and operations. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, quizzes, a mid-term and final exam, and a short paper.</i>	\$502.62
ESMS-1400 Foundations of Safety & Security (Required in Diploma and Degree)	Examine how safety and security link with operations, explore factors that impact safety and security, learn to conduct basic threat and vulnerability assessments, identify necessary security and loss prevention systems, and develop employee safety and security awareness programs. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, completing three case studies, and completing a final paper.</i>	\$502.62
ESMS-2340 Foundations of Business Continuity Management (Required in Diploma and Degree) Prerequisite: ENGL-1100	Explore key concepts and intersects of business continuity management, including business continuity, crisis management, emergency management, and business recovery. Learn how to ensure that an organization can plan for, respond to, and recover from a crisis or disaster. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, completing a short essay, completing a reflective paper, and developing a team presentation with related proposal and annotated bibliography.</i>	\$502.62
ESMS-3210 Information Security Management (Required Degree only) Prerequisites: ESMS-2210 and BUSN-1101 and ENGL-1110	Study ethical theories and legislative and organizational policies governing protection of information, consider potential threats and vulnerabilities of information, and examine how information should be protected, what level of protection must be afforded to that information, how the security of information should be monitored, and how, when, and to whom that information should be released. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, applying business writing skills in completing two memos, completing a term paper, and completing a final exam.</i>	\$502.62

<p>ESMS-3330 Technology Applications in Security & Emergency Management Environments (Required Degree Only) Prerequisite: ENGL-1110</p>	<p>Examine how technology can support multiple source data integration, risk assessment, safety and security, and planning and response to emergencies. Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, completing a technology needs assessment, completing a reflection paper, developing a recommendation for acquiring a technology, and developing an infographic.</p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>ESMS-4220 Ethical Issues in Public Safety <i>Course runs July 22-November 4</i> (Required Degree Only) Prerequisite: ETHS-1100</p>	<p>Examine the moral and ethical issues that can arise in public safety and security management and develop strategies to monitor ethical behaviour. Explore within an ethical framework the inter-relationships of personal values, individual responsibility, decision making, discretion, and accountability. Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, and completing three inter-related short papers analyzing ethical theories and developing a framework to interpret and address an ethical dilemma.</p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>ESMS-4410 Strategic Partnering (Required Degree Only) Prerequisites: ESMS-1200 and ESMS-2400 and ENGL-1110</p>	<p>Gain the knowledge and skills to interact with key internal and external stakeholders in order to optimize safety and security services within your organization and community. Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, presenting and moderating a discussion on one of the course readings, completing a long essay, developing a report on a strategic partnership in response to a fictitious event, and developing a group presentation.</p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>ESMS-4900 Capstone Project (Required Degree Only) Prerequisite: Program approval</p>	<p>The capstone project involves students applying and synthesizing emergency management and security theory, concepts, and principles learned throughout their undergraduate studies. <i>Students are graded on developing a project proposal, performing a literature review, developing a term paper, and preparing materials for presenting their paper (poster, presentation, optional attendance at JIBC research day).</i></p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>FIRE-2145 Financial Management (Required Diploma & Degree)</p>	<p>Explore planning and control activities through the perspective of an effective, innovative and fiscally responsible leader, looking at strategy formulation, task control and management control. During this course, the primary focus will be on your perspective as a leader in a nonprofit/public sector organization, and what actions you can help your organization take to make the best and most innovative use of the resources available in carrying out the organizational mandate. As a result, you are expected to undertake assignments that illustrate your understanding and mastery of the concepts around fiscal leadership in the nonprofit/public sector.</p>	<p>\$680.70</p>

<p>INTL-3410 Introduction to Intelligence Analysis (Required Degree Only) Prerequisites: RESM-2100 and ENGL-1110</p>	<p>Apply the key components of the intelligence cycle to the collection, analysis and dissemination of intelligence in support of various corporate goals and objectives. Acquire the skill to conduct elementary intelligence charting techniques within the context of public safety and corporate security and be able to delineate between information, intelligence, and evidence. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, completing quizzes, completing a number of practical activities related to intelligence analysis, and completing a final paper focusing on a case study provided by the instructor.</i></p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>PSAD-3100 Public Safety Service & Gov. Relations *Restricted to students enrolled in BPSA program</p>	<p>Learners will acquire the skills and knowledge to build and enhance sound relationships between public safety operations and government authorities. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, and completing three short papers.</i></p>	<p>\$680.70</p>
<p>PSAD-4900 BPSA Capstone *Restricted to students enrolled in BPSA program</p>	<p>The capstone project involves students applying and synthesizing the theory, concepts, and principles learned throughout their undergraduate studies. <i>Students are graded on developing a project proposal, performing a literature review, and developing a term paper.</i></p>	<p>\$1,361.44</p>

<p>BUSN-3110 Project Management (Required Degree)</p>	<p>Learners will define the elements of a project; assess how the elements interrelate for project success; and apply this to support a project from inception through to conclusion and evaluation. Learners develop an understanding of the whole process and characteristics of effective project management, including project initiation, project planning, project implementation and project termination.</p>	<p>\$629.29</p>
<p>ENGL-1100 Academic Writing (Required Diploma & Degree)</p>	<p>This course will help participants to develop post-secondary level communication and composition skills. Learners will be introduced to the study of library resources, the analysis of reading materials, and will write preparatory papers from reports and reviews to a research paper. Participants will learn to analyze sources and by completing several written assignments, will develop confidence in written communication.</p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>ENGL-1110 Critical Reading & Writing (Required Diploma and Degree)</p>	<p>This course is an introduction to active literary reading and writing skills, focusing on at least three literary genres. Learners will be introduced to the basic structural principles and rhetorical strategies of literary texts by observing structural and rhetorical theory applied to specific poems, fictions, and plays. This course is writing intensive.</p>	<p>\$502.62</p>

PSYC-1100 Introduction to Psychology (Elective Option Degree)	This course introduces students to many of the major topics of psychology emphasizing the scientific approach to understanding human behaviour. Some of the topics include sensation, growth and development, learning, memory, emotion and disorders.	\$502.62
RESM-2100 Research Methods (Required Diploma and Degree)	This course will provide learners with the knowledge and basic tools to conceptualize core research questions and to design appropriate methods for hypothesis testing, data collection and analysis. As a foundation course, the content will focus primarily on qualitative methods, participant observation, comparative studies, case study research, ethnography, descriptive field studies, secondary data analysis.	\$502.62
